Six Weaknesses of the Articles of Confederation:

- 1. No central leadership (executive branch)
- 2. Congress had no power to tax
- 3. No national court system (judicial branch)
- 4. Congress had no power to enforce its laws
- 5. Congress had no power to regulate trade
- 6. Changes to the Articles required unanimous consent of 13 states
