SS.7.CG.1.9 Benchmark Clarification 3: Students will analyze how government power is limited by separation of powers and/or checks and balances.

To keep the government from abusing its powers, the U.S. Constitution uses a **separation of powers** system that includes **checks and balances** as part of that system. The power to make, enforce, and interpret laws is separated into three different branches of government. The government is limited even more by checks and balances. This means that each branch can "check" (limit) the powers of the other two branches.

<u>checks and balances</u> - a principle of the federal government, according to the U.S. Constitution, that allows each branch of government to limit the power of the other branches

<u>separation of powers</u> - the structure of the federal government, according to the U.S. Constitution, that sets up three branches with their own distinct powers and responsibilities
