



JURIES

1. In the other videos in this series, we've learned about the trial process. One of the most important parts of the trial process and who decides who is guilty or not guilty is the jury.

4. Remember that juries play a big role in the trial process. They consist of a group of people who are selected to listen to the facts and evidence of a case in a criminal (and sometimes civil) trial. After they hear the evidence presented during the trial, they deliberate to make a decision, or come to a verdict. After they deliberate and think about the evidence, juries will find a defendant in a criminal trial guilty or not guilty. And if they're in a civil trial, they'll find for the defendant or the plaintiff. All based on the evidence.
5. But why do we have juries? Well, the Sixth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution protects the right of every citizen to have a trial by jury in criminal cases, and this is so very important. To provide this right means that citizens must give up their time to serve on a jury. Adult U.S. citizens who are called for "jury duty" will receive a jury summons in the mail and must report to the court on the date and at the time listed on the summons. Persons called for jury duty can be fined or jailed for not showing up. Serving on a jury is one of the most important things a citizen can do for themselves and their fellow citizens.

7. So let's recap what we've learned. The right to a jury in a criminal trial is an important constitutional right guaranteed by the 6th Amendment. You are called to jury duty with a jury summons, and not attending jury duty can result in fines or jail.
